FAIRFIELD

We have a wonderful tradition over many years of knitting for the Waikato Newborn Unit, Plunket and the Middlemore Foundation. One year we also made approx. 30 blankets for women undergoing fistula surgery in Addis Ababa, Ethiopa. (We were lucky enough to get onside with the NZ Consul who didn't mind transporting the blankets in his luggage allowance!)



Much of our knitting is done by friends outside of Inner Wheel. A couple of them are not well but they love knitting Fish'n'Chip jumpers and beanies for the little ones who may not have much in the way of warm clothes. Our own Members have added to the collection and have made many small blankets for the little ones.

HOWICK

Christmas last year we baked biscuits to drop off to First Responders and Front-Line Workers. Club Members also helped at the Brit and Euro Car Show and we had a cake

stand fundraiser at the Pakuranga Rotary's carnival. At both these events we had a show case stand of our Club! To spread the word of our incredible organization, Member Huibrie interviewed Adrienne Davies on our local radio station. We are still collecting goods for Women's Refuge and other organizations. Early in the year we gathered a full car load of bedding, towels and clothes for those so badly affected by the recent floods. Our lovely knitters also put together two bags of knitting to be donated to *Mummys in Need*. We have enjoyed our meetings with interesting speakers who have exposed us to many different topics, including an inspiring speaker from *Star Jam*.

OREWA AND WHANGAPAROA

We welcomed Lorraine Baily to a monthly Club Meeting to speak about *Sweet Louise*, a charity that provides specialist care and compassion to Kiwis with incurable breast cancer: "to live as well as possible for as long as possible". We turned out in pink outfits to welcome our speaker and to show our support for this very worthwhile charity. Some of our fitter Members have also accepted the challenge to walk 50km during May, supported by



donations from Members not so fit. During our busy year supporting all the charities and enjoying the social side of Inner Wheel, we were also very proud to be announced by IWNZ to have the biggest Membership increase over the year. May this continue!

PARAHAKI OF WHANGAREI

On several Saturdays throughout the year Members have come together to prepare and fill women's and children's bags for Whangarei Women's Refuge. This year providing 80 children's and 106 women's bags.



A couple of our Members do a magnificent job of making the bags in their spare time. These are then ironed and filled at our working bee in a Member's home, which is always followed by lunch and chat.

The women's bags include toiletries, while the children's bags include toiletries and pens, pads and games. At a recent meeting we

invited one of the local refuge organisers to talk to us. It was most interesting to hear the many and varied situations that require refuge help, how they go about this, and of course how much they appreciate our bags.

SHORE CITY

One of our many highlights was speaker Karen Ross from *Foster Hope*. We have an annual PJ Day when Members bring winter pyjamas to donate to children in foster care.

Foster Hope was started by two ladies in Auckland and there are now branches throughout New Zealand. We were shown examples of the backpacks of essentials provided to each child so that they do not arrive on their caregiver's doorstep empty-handed. These packs include a carry all bag, toiletries, and some personal items that they can call their own (books, soft toys, etc.).

When a child is released from foster care they are still protected in that the government often provides them with housing and Foster Hope also makes up Flat packs for these young adults.







Ahuriri describe their knitting as "Warm, Woolly and Welcoming items of clothing", while Nouméa Pleasance tell us that they distribute "slippers, beanies, socks, and little sweaters made by our little hands." Isn't that just a beautiful summary of why we all knit?

INTRODUCING OUR FURTHEST FLUNG CLUB: NOUMÉA PLAISANCE

It was great meeting Chantal (Incoming President for 2023 – 24) and Nadine at the Conference. They are such lovely bubbly ladies. And then I thought – we don't really have an idea of how Inner Wheel works in New Caledonia ... So I asked and received this lovely report on what this Club is up to – and the photos are delightful! Editor.



In the words of Incoming Club President Chantal:

We represent IW Nouméa Plaisance which celebrates its 35th anniversary this year!

We are 20 Members and at Changeover, I (Chantal) will once again be President.

Although it is hard to get back to an active life after 2 years of Covid, we have kept our Inner Wheel relationships going using WhatsApp. Our main aim is to help women and children, but also men in difficulty, as far as we can.

We have very good contacts with Rotary Clubs and participate in common actions.

Since 2021 we have committed ourselves to supporting the emergency accommodation system ("Appartements relais") which sadly

remains necessary, raising funds to purchase items, such as bedding, beds, a table and a fridge that families can take with them when they leave their temporary accommodation. We work together with the municipal social action centre (Les missions du centre communal d'action sociale (CCAS), the police, a doctor, and a psychologist to ensure that people are well supported. The group currently has five secret apartments - 3 at Nouméa and 2 at Dumbea – where women can stay in safety for between 2 and 6 months when they are relocated. We are very grateful for the help of NZ291.

In addition to many small actions that we do every day, we have, over the past year:



- Fundraised an outing to the Cinema, and a concert evening with women singing choral works, jazz, and so on.
- Collected money for Avec, which takes care of medical evacuees and also collected and sold items made by Club Members over Christmas.
- Provided meals for the elders and helped fund dance lessons for disabled children, teenagers and adults; participated in a book Club for young people and helped a new women's soccer team.



We also participated in help after Hurricane Gabrielle –at the Conference, we brought a 22 kg piece of luggage with us which contained adult and children's linen, as well as slippers, beanies, socks, and little sweaters made by our little hands.

And, of course, we also had fun – including, as you can see in the photos here celebrating Galette des Rois (*Epiphany - Chantal crocheted the crown, she tells me, Ed.*) in January, and enjoying the songs prepared by the 30 students from Normandy College in response to the Club's contribution to their trip to NAPIER next September.

What a busy year this has been. My car has been driven many miles as I visited all thirteen Clubs, celebrated Club Birthday milestones, District meetings and a conference. Just as all the District Chairman I have spoken to have said, my highlights has also been meeting the people. The hospitality, generosity with your time, your knowledge and your stories has humbled me. I am so glad that Covid restrictions have passed, and we are now able to spend time with each other, because it is the people that are the jewels in our Inner Wheel World, and it is spending time with each other that is the most fun.

He aha te mea nui o te ao (What is the most important thing in the world?) He tangata, he tangata, he tangata (It is the people, it is the people, it is the people)

I hope to be able to spend more time with everyone, get to know more people and share more stories. I am looking forward to some fun weekends at District meetings where we will have more time to have fun and get to know each other.

My dream is to see an Inner Wheel Club in every town in NZ. Then when you move you can just transfer to the Club in that town and have an instant group of friends and support network.

KAPITI



Due to Covid our fundraising plans were very limited, however we were able to have a Fashion Parade and the funds raised were donated to The Kapiti Women's Centre who run the local Women's Refuge.

Over the year we were faced with several crises needing support and I was really thrilled with Members' response, both in donations of goods and money. Our biggest was Cyclone Gabrielle affecting the Hawkes Bay part of District NZ294. I was very fortunate to be able to coordinate with my quilt Club – Kapiti Quilters – and we were able to collect 22 handmade quilts along with other donations of other items at our March Empowerment Day. These quilts and donated goods have gone to help families impacted by Cyclone Gabrielle.

MANUWATU CENTRAL CONNECTION

One of the highlights of our Inner Wheel year was hosting the IWNZ294



September District Day in Palmerston North. We were fortunate to have a great venue with excellent facilities at the Christian Community Church. Our team catered well for the day with all Club Members participating. Along with the raffles we were able to raise good funds for our charity projects and have fun along the way. We donated these funds to Starfish House in Feilding and *Grandparents Raising Grandchildren*.

We also enjoyed some great social functions with dinners at Wharerata and at the Yatai Japanese restaurant for International month, ten pin bowling, along with the great speakers at our monthly meetings.

NEW PLYMOUTH NORTH



For many years, we have been making dolls for our local Hospital. Frances McCurdy coordinates this project, sourcing white sheets from Dry Cleaners and Laundromats. A

clipboard is handed out at our July meeting and Members put their names down to cut out, stamp and bundle the dolls. The bundles are distributed at our August meeting and Members take them home and stitch them. September is Doll Stuffing – after a feed of fish and chips and coleslaw, some of us stuff the dolls, and a few ladies sew up the hole. It's a fun night, and we are never short of helpers, completing between 250-275 dolls.

The dolls are given to children who are hospitalized – if a child is having surgery, the Surgeon will draw on the doll's body wherever the surgery is happening.

PALMERSTON NORTH

Palmerston North Club has been very productive and social this year. We have our monthly coffee and chat and walk and talk which are well attended. We have visited a few gardens and outings to the movies have proved popular. Our Club has discovered the fun of Bingo!

Mary McKenzie made 185 toilet bags and 85 drainage bags for the hospital and 134 wheat bags for the Arohanui Hospice – Members donate both material to make these items and supply items to fill the toilet bags. A fundraising moringn tea, hosted by Joan Spencer, and



a lunch, hosted by Barb Mouat raised money for the Arohanui Hospice and the Cancer Society.

We discovered that Parkinson's Manawatu did not have wheelchairs for their Members to attend appointments and meetings so we donated a wheelchair and Sue Carpenter also donated her late mother's wheelchair.

PLIMMERTON

We do well at getting out and about as a group. There are places that you may not want to go to by yourself but with some lady friends it is fun. There are places you may always have intended to get to and our Inner Wheel Club makes that happen. Other friends and husbands can join us. We are fortunate in that we have the train to hop on as a group!

TELLING THE STORY OF OUR NEWEST CLUB: CAROL HASKETT ON THE BRAIDED RIVERS CLUB

Throughout NZ Membership numbers are falling, making it imperative that we retain current and gain new Members.

Could a Next Generation Club be formed? YES. After four meetings we had 20 women on our email list interested in joining Inner Wheel. At the fifth meeting a new Club was chartered with 13 Members: the youngest is 22, there is one in her thirties with a new baby, and a real estate agent in her early fourties ... the rest are in their fourties/fifties, all are working.

The best way to get women to join us is to share information about IW though advertising in the community, using posters about town or local publications, or asking in person. An information sheet (available on the IWNZ website under Membership resources) was handed out wherever possible and shared via email with all new prospects for them to read and share with others. You can change the contacts and the service groups to suit your Club or District.

A new Club may not want business meetings every month and there is no requirement to do so in our Constitution. They will use the Inner Wheel International guidelines and choose their own way to meet, socialise, and do service.

I ask that all IW Members work to invite potential Members to join our existing Clubs but also look at forming new Clubs within our Communities and within Communities that don't currently have Inner Wheel.



As you will all be aware, my darling and beloved mother passed away last Monday. I am here and not with my family because this is what she wanted. She was passionate about Inner Wheel and prior to her passing had already told me that I needed to stay in NZ and fulfil my responsibilities.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank everyone for the messages of condolence and the beautiful flowers I have received.

The living room looks like a florist shop, I am truly grateful and humbled by your wonderful words and the memories you have of mum. I had no idea that she had inspired so many of you through me. Thank you for your love and support.

I wrote my speech prior to Mum's passing and have decided not to change it except to put references to Mum in the past tense. Please bear with me if this turns out to be a bit emotional.

I thought I would start by telling you a little about me. I was born in the UK, you probably guessed that from the accent, my father was an accountant who sadly passed away over 40 years ago and my mother was a teacher who would have been 99 on 5th June and was the last living WAAF in the world. I have an elder sister, Bridget, who is an economist who in 2019 was awarded a CBE for services to the economy, she's the clever one, and I have a younger brother Alan who is a builder. I am married to Phill who teaches technology and have one son Robert who drives an ambulance in the UK and is 41 on 9th May, he lives with his lovely partner Ella who is a nurse. Phill and I emigrated to New Zealand in 2008, nearly 15 years ago and have never ever regretted it, and in fact we both became New Zealand citizens in October 2017. As for me, I don't have time here to tell you about all the things I got up to, including getting expelled from school, but that is quite another story. During my career I have been a PA, Dressmaker, Shop Owner and a teacher but am now very happily retired and so busy I have no idea how I found the time to work.

So, what does Inner Wheel mean to me? Well apart from the incredible and lifelong friendships I've made over the years, it is a way that I can give back and make a difference and I learnt this from an early age. I grew up in an atmosphere of service above self as Dad was a charter Member of his Rotary Club and Mum was the Charter President of her IW Club back in 1967. I was just 13, I will let you do the math, and after 56 years of service Mum was just as passionate about IW and about giving back and making a difference. Each of you know why you joined IW, perhaps it was for friendship or to help in your community, but all of you, by being a part of this incredible organisation, are making a difference. Last year Members, you, volunteered just over 53,000 hours of your time and donated nearly \$279,000 to over 250 charities and worthy causes, which is a remarkable achievement. Have any of you ever thought what would happen if IW was no longer here, what would happen to all those people you have helped and made a difference to in their lives. Do you want to see that happen? Well, if the answer is no, then it is time for each and every one of us to stand up, give back, change what is happening and revalidate the reason you joined IW.

To prove that everything I have been talking about is truly possible, as you have heard we have a new Club chartering, which is so exciting, and I would like to take this opportunity to offer my sincere congratulations to Clare Chapman and Carol Haskett from the IW Club of Ashburton for all their hard work and dedication in bringing this about. It is an amazing achievement and just proves what can be done with enthusiasm and a great Membership team.

I am truly honoured to become your National President and I will do everything in my power to help IWNZ grow and to be recognized, but I can't do it alone. A Final Word from International Inner Wheel Board Director 2022-2023: Dot Anderson-Lee



I asked Dot to tell us a bit about her year as Board Director (and I'm keeping a bit of the history she sent along for the September Inner Link). Editor.

For this year's International Inner Wheel Board, I was allocated the Non-Districted Clubs of Mombasa and Safia (Kenya), Riga-Jurmala (Latvia), and Kaunas and Vilnius (Lithuania). I am very excited about the possibility of a new Non-Districted Club in Kenya being formed.

I was appointed to the Covid-Response Committee, a committee formed to decide on where best to allocate the funds raised by Inner Wheel Members throughout the World specifically for Covid-19 purposes. We decided on the *Take a Shot* programme in Ghana, specifically aimed at Women and Girls. The proposed cost of the *Take a Shot* programme is 70,000 GBP of which we have contributed 42,000 GBP.

We researched many countries, but most had already completed their

vaccination programmes or were well through them.

I have thoroughly enjoyed my year on the IIW Board and meeting the other Board Directors, 7 of whom are going to be having a second term.
